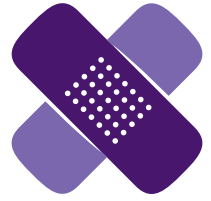

Killie's Contributions



Since 2019, Kilmarnock Football Club has supported Crosshouse Children's Fund, donating an incredible £11,400 in total. Callum, born prematurely, with just a 50% survival chance, defied the odds to become Crosshouse Children's Fund's first London Marathon runner, finishing in under four hours.

Callum and his twin brother, Andrew, were born three months early at Ayrshire Central Hospital in August 1997.

Speedy Skeletons:

BoneXpert Brings Fast Diagnostics to Crosshouse Hospital

We are thrilled to announce that the Children's Unit will soon benefit from BoneXpert, a new software funded by your generous donations. BoneXpert helps doctors estimate a child's skeletal maturity, crucial for

diagnosing various conditions. It allows instant image analysis, speeding up diagnosis and treatment. Thank you for bringing this cutting-edge technology to our Children's Unit!

Appy to Help

Crosshouse Children's Fund has committed more funding to an app that trains parents, carers, and professionals who care for children with complex needs. The app, expected to save NHS Ayrshire & Arran over £140,000 annually, offers videos and resources on topics like

epilepsy, diabetes, respiratory conditions, and anaphylaxis. It provides instant access to vital information for parents and staff in schools and nurseries across Ayrshire. Initially funded by Crosshouse Children's Fund in 2020 during Covid-19, the Paediatric Training App has been extended for another two years.

Supporting Families in Ayrshire

Family support services are essential in a hospital setting, offering emotional, informational, and practical assistance during difficult times.

Crosshouse Children's Fund has backed a nationwide campaign to help understand and prevent unexpected deaths in children and young people, by appointing Ayrshire's first Paediatric Bereavement Liaison Nurse, Victoria Maxwell.

Victoria's work with families in Ayrshire and Arran will influence the Scotland-wide strategy to identify trends in unexplained deaths at regional and national levels. Additionally, Victoria provides vital support to families coping with an unexpected loss.



Often families will be in crisis when visiting hospital and while the nature of the crisis varies, Crosshouse Children's Fund tries to provide whatever is needed at the time.

Such support extends to funding patient transport, providing emergency clothing for mothers and babies, and more.

Sadly, the support required for families sometimes relates to the loss of a child, so the charity has also recently funded bereavement books in Ayrshire Maternity, for parents and siblings.
